





For today's poetry lesson we will be creating our own concrete poem!


Concrete poems are Art and Poetry rolled into one!

How to make a concrete poem

First,


Mind map words or phrases that describe the Windrush.



Next,

Use a **pencil** and lightly draw an outline of the Empire Windrush on a blank piece of paper. Make it big but simple!

Last,

With a handwriting pen, write over the pencil lines using all of the words and phrases from your mind map. You can keep repeating the words until all of the pencil lines have been filled in.
