



<p><u>Lesson 1</u> Esio Trot Watch the video clips to hear Mr B read the beginning of Roald Dahl's story, Esio Trot. Reread the story so far from the text file on the school website, paying particular attention to the message at the end. Can you decode Mr Hoppy's message? Research the story here if you get stuck! https://www.roalddahl.com/roald-dahl/stories/a-e/esio-trot</p> <p><u>Lesson 2</u> Comprehension Have you understood the story so far? Can you see how Roald Dahl's words bring our characters to life? Answer the 10 questions at the end of the story text file, using full sentences to show what you know.</p> <p><u>Lesson 3</u> Creative writing Do you remember how to write instructions? Write instructions for how to prepare Alfie's house for hibernation. Don't forget to begin by listing the items you need, then number the things you'll do and finish with a 'did you know?' box. Look at the text on p. 14-15 to remind yourself what Alfie would need, but don't be afraid to invent some extra elements too!</p>	<p>https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/year-4/</p> <p><u>Lesson 1</u> Making amounts of money Please note that the worksheet for this lesson is titled 'Pounds and Pence.' With some of the questions on the sheet for this lesson, I recommend providing some real coins to match the coins in the question. It can really help to be able to touch & move them. Also remember that the responses shown on the answers are only a guide to what a child might write – lots of answers could be written differently and still be just as good. Some children might only complete Q1-4.</p> <p><u>Lesson 2</u> Compare and order amounts of money It's useful to remember that the term 'inequality symbol' is used to refer to these signs: < > As I explained last week, we often ask children to think of them as the jaws of a hungry croc, who's always facing the biggest meal. We look at a picture and write whatever we like about it. I've chosen a tortoise picture this week to keep us thinking about our story. Think about whether you'll write about the tortoise, the person/people who live in the house or somebody coming to visit. As with last week, it is well worth 'warming up' with a few questions about rounding simpler numbers before starting the lesson. For example, ask: on the numberline below, what numbers should go on the intervals? Between the intervals? Which of the numbers on the intervals round up to 200? Down to 100? How can you tell whether to round one of them up or down?</p>  <p><u>Lesson 4</u> Solve problems with money Please note that the worksheet for this lesson is titled 'Four Operations.' Problems like these can be very tricky for children. It is better for many children to discuss a few of these problems together with an adult than to try to solve them all without help, but if your child can work independently, that's great!</p>	<p><u>Lesson 3</u> Hokusai As we've been looking at the water cycle in lesson 1, let's find out about a famous Japanese artist who made prints depicting mountains, rivers and the sea. First look at some of Hokusai's artwork below. Find out how he made his prints by looking at the clip here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kEubj3c2How It is a bit like the chinoiserie printing we did in school! Draw a mountain scene of your own, but be sure to include all of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A cloudy or stormy sky . • Waves or a flowing river in the foreground. • A mountain in the background. • Some birds or other animals. <p>Colour your drawing as brightly as you can.</p>	<p><u>Lesson 3</u> Explore the #ThisIsPE activities.
